

PROGRAMMING INSTRUCTIONS: PROCEDURES, REGULATIONS and GUIDELINES

PROCEDURES

1. Make a tentative list of courses for all future high school years, including requirements and electives. You will have opportunities to make changes each year.
2. Discuss your choices with your parent/guardian and obtain their signature before turning in your final request.
3. On the request form, circle that classes you plan to take next year. On the scantron form, bubble in the circle located next to these same classes. These courses will be entered in the computer and will become your schedule unless changes are made by your guidance advisor. Realistic and alternate electives must also be listed. You will be mailed a list of these courses in May 2008. This will be your last opportunity to make any schedule changes.
4. A Guidance Advisor will review your course request. It may be necessary to change your selection because of:
 - Ineligibility (past grades, teacher recommendation, etc.)
 - Over enrolled courses
 - Conflict in schedule (two or more classes taught at the same time)
 - Canceled courses due to lack of interest

If necessary, a change will be made based on the alternate courses you have listed and what appears to be in your best interest.

REGULATIONS & GUIDELINES

1. It is recommended that students take six classes.
2. All classes receive 10 units per year or 5 units per semester if a passing grade is earned, with the exception of Student Aide; which is half credit (2.5 per semester).
3. Repeating Courses: A maximum number of units that can be earned per course are 10. You will not earn more credit for repeating a course with the exception of Music, Graphic Publication, Journalism, PE and Student Aide (maximum 10 units).
4. All courses are one year long. Students are encouraged to choose courses carefully because of the year long commitment. Schedule changes will not be made in the fall. Choose wisely now and plan to live with your decisions.
5. If you sign up for an AP class you will be enrolled in the class for the entire year. If you choose to drop the class you will not be given a replacement class for the remainder of the semester and possibly the entire year; depending on space available second semester.
6. Activity and Athletic Eligibility: Check the Handbook for specific rules and regulations. To be eligible to participate in high school activities and athletics, a student must:
 - be enrolled in a minimum of 25 each semester
 - pass at least 20 units in the grading period preceding participation
 - maintain a minimum grade point average of 2.0 in all enrolled courses on a 4.0 scale.
7. CCOC—Central County Occupational Center: Priority placement is determined through an application process. Enrollment at CCOC is equivalent to 3 class periods. A student must take 4 classes at Del Mar in addition to CCOC. Applications are available in the Student Services Center.
